We were delighted to learn that three of our members have been recognised for their work and achievements in today's awards for the Order of Australia. All of them received the award of Member (AM) in

the General Division.

Dr Sue Graham-Taylor

Sue receives her award for her role in conservation and the environment, air quality and waste management as well as being a noted historian. Sue was the inaugural James Sykes Battye Memorial Fellow for her work on the history of the Swan River. Some of Sue's work can be viewed on a special website Swan River Stories: a social, political and environmental

history of Perth Water at the State Library of WA http://slwa.wa.gov.au/swan_river Sue is a former President of the Conservation Council of WA and is currently President of the History Council of Western Australia.

Professor Jenny Gregory

Jenny received her award in recognition of her excellence as an academic and for her role in local and regional historiography. For many years she has taught history at the University of Western Australia's and is the author of historical works including 'City of Light: A History of Perth Since the 1950s'. Most recently she has been the driving force behind the publication of the 'Historical Encyclopedia of Western Australia' and is its co-editor with Jan Gothard. Jenny was also Inaugural President of the History Council of WA.

Emeritus Professor David Black

David has been honoured for his achievements in Education and the Social Sciences and the political history of Western Australia. For more than 25 years, David has been Chairperson of the Parliamentary History Advisory Committee in WA, responsible for guiding the Western Australian Parliamentary History Project and its oral history program. In 2004 he was appointed as a Parliamentary Fellow (History). David is the author of numerous works including 'House to House: The story of Western Australia's Government and Parliament Houses over 175 years' which he co-authored with the late Phillip Pendal.

Our Page in History

Since the launch of Our Page in History in November last year The State Library of Western Australia Foundation has rolled out the first Public Library at the Bassendean Memorial Library. The Hon Donna Faragher, Minister for Environment; Youth and the Member for the East Metropolitan region officially launched the first Our Page in History Booth in Bassendean on Wednesday 3rd of February. Local history practitioners were in attendance as well as various groups associated

with the Bassendean Library.

The State Library of WA Foundation would like to work closely with the Friends of Battye to make the project a significant tool to capture what Western Australia looks like for future generations while preserving the history of our state. A booth has been placed in the State Library

and a volunteer schedule for assisting in scanning and using the site will soon be in place. The Foundation encourages feedback from the Friends of Battye to help us make the site more userfriendly and encourage other historical groups to begin their own pages.

News from the Battye Historian

The Royal Flying Doctor Service (WA); the Past, the Present and the Way of the Future.

Digitisation at the State Library

The State Library of Western Australia is responsible for a state collection of library material, including a comprehensive collection of material relating to Western Australia and its people. The collections include books, journals, maps, printed music, pictures, manuscripts and oral history recordings.

Reformatting, primarily by microfilming and digitisation, has enabled the State Library to both preserve collections and employ innovative ways of providing access to its collections.

By reformatting its collections the Library aims to build more accessible content relating to Western Australia's documentary and cultural heritage to support research and library programs; and, to preserve rare and fragile collections.

In addition to these objectives the Library has further specific goals relating to digitisation:

- To enable people, regardless of location, to directly access and use a range of collection materials without having to visit the Library; and
- to engage with new audiences by making collections available online and through innovative technologies.

Over the past 3 months the State Library has digitised over 700 objects from the Battye Library collections, and over the coming months this figure will grow exponentially.

Western Australian Premier's Book Awards - Call for Entries

The State Library of Western Australia announces the Call for Entries for the 2008 and 2009 Western Australian Premier's Book Awards.

The 2008 and 2009 Awards will be judged separately but presented at one function in early September 2010.

Entry is open to books and scripts which have been published/produced between 1 January 2008 to 31 December 2008 (2008 Awards) and 1 January 2009 to 31 December 2009 (2009 Awards). For the first time, entry has been opened nationally. To be eligible authors must be citizens or permanent residents of Australia or whose work has Australia as its primary focus. The closing date for entries is Wednesday 31 March 2010.

There are six categories in the Awards: Fiction, Non-Fiction, Children's Book, Writing for Young Adults, Poetry and Scripts. The State Library of Western Australia West Australian History Award is selected from works submitted to the above categories.

The Premier's Prize of \$25,000 is presented to the overall winner, chosen from the category winners. Prize money is made available by the Western Australian Government. The West Australian History Award is sponsored by the State Library of Western Australia. Short listed entries will be announced in June 2010.

Margaret Medcalf Award

Nominations are called for the Margaret Medcalf Award. This award recognises excellence in referencing and research in the use of State archives and honours Miss Margaret Medcalf OAM, Western Australia's second State Archivist, for her valuable contribution to the development of archives in Western Australia. The winner of the Award receives a cash prize of \$1000.

Works nominated for the award must demonstrate use of the State Archives collection, held by the State Records Office. Selection criteria include level of use of the State archives collection, the quality of referencing of archival sources, the level of the work's contribution to knowledge, whether the work uses new archival sources or if known archives are interpreted in new or different ways, and the quality of the work's presentation.

Nominated works need not be published, may be fiction or non-fiction, and in any media. Copies of nominated works must be supplied to the State Records Office, to enable short-listing and further consideration by the judging panel. Short-listed and winning works will be retained permanently by the State Records Office. Any work completed in the 2009 calendar year is eligible for nomination. Nominations may be submitted by anyone, including the author of the work.

Nominations for the Award, along with a copy of the nominated work, should be sent to the Director: State Records, Alexander Library Building, Perth Cultural Centre, Perth, WA 6000, by close of business Wednesday, 31 March 2010.

Lindsay James Peet - 'Gem of Time' 2009

Lindsay is great friend of the Battye Library and a generous supporter and contributor to the State's heritage collections. Over many years he has donated important and valuable collections of original materials,



including personal papers and photographs to the Battye Library and State Records Office archives. In addition he has contributed enormously to the Library's published works, ephemera, and map collections. Battye Library staff appreciate Lindsay's efforts and recall fondly the times when he would regularly pop into the library and deposit with them bags of ephemeral publications which he had assiduously gathered on his many trips around the State. Lindsay understood that these brochures, flyers and pamphlets,

all items which are generally tossed away, give a unique perspective on Western Australian society and are a precious research resource for the future.

His passion for Western Australian history is infectious and Lindsay's deep

knowledge of many aspects of our heritage and past is remarkable. He has a particular interest in the history of military aviation in this State and has worked with the National Trust (WA) to identify and preserve sites of importance. Lindsay has researched and written authoritatively on aspects of World War Two as well as the history of real estate development in Western Australia. Most recently he has written articles on these topics for the *Historical Encyclopedia of Western Australia*. Lindsay holds a Bachelor of Science, a Graduate Diploma in Heritage Studies, a Diploma in Real Estate Management and is a qualified valuer. He has been working towards a Master of Arts degree at Curtin University.

Lindsay was instrumental in the establishment and management of the Historical Records Rescue Consortium (HRRC) Project which was sponsored by the Friends of Battye Library with a \$3million grant from Lotterywest. Lindsay's parents, Cyril and Ethel Peet are commemorated in the memorial fund which was used to preserve an important collection of photographs identified through the HRRC Project.

As an indicator of Lindsay's deep concern and compassion for those less fortunate, he has been involved in several community and charitable groups, such as 'Lifeline' and the Children's Leukaemia & Cancer Research Foundation. He is a long term member of the Friends of Battye Library, the National Trust (WA), and the Royal Western Australian Historical Society, and has served on the executive of the Professional Historians Association.

The Friends of the Battye Library (Inc.) would like to add to Lindsay's many awards and achievements and show our appreciation of his commitment and generosity by listing him as a "Gem of Time" – a list that will last to acknowledge the contribution of outstanding men and women to the recording, collection, and preservation of Western Australia's history.

The Honour Board list can be viewed on the third floor of the State Library of WA, just outside the lift near the Battye Library.

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Anglican Orphanage records now available for research at the Battye Library.

In 2007 the Anglican Archives in Perth was awarded a Community Heritage Grant, part of which was for a Significance Assessment of the archives. Recommendation number seven from this report identified the need to microfilm the early orphanage records, some of the collection's rarer and most significant records and provide them to the Battye Library.

In August 2009 this was partly accomplished when 12 archival boxes were sent to David Whiteford and his team for microfilming. Too fragile for research in the past, these volumes are now available to the general public and will hopefully give historians a new source of information on early childcare in Perth.

The records span the years 1872 to 1955 and include Matrons' Diaries of Swan Boys Orphanage 1898-1900, these hand written accounts of

the boys' daily small illnesses and Matrons' remedies make for very interesting reading. Financial Records of the Swan Boys Orphanage 1903-1915 and Swan Native and Half Caste Missions 1893-1915, account and statement books for Redhill Industry School for Boys 1903-1908 and Industrial Farm 1920-1922, Accounts and expenditure for St. George's Girl's Lodge 1897 -1904 and Minutes of



the Perth Protestant Orphanage Committee 1881-1888.

Hopefully in 2010 the Anglican Orphanage Committee Minutes 1899-1952 will also be copied. Thanks go to Jennie Carter who did the Significance Assessment of the Anglican Church Archives in May 2008 and David Whiteford for his ongoing support and advice in organising microfilming of archives in our collection by the Battye Library.

Update on restoration of Gwambygine Homestead



We mentioned in an earlier newsletter that I had been involved in securing a large grant from the Commonwealth Government to rescue the old Gwambygine Homestead, just outside York. This mud built house was built originally by the Wittenoom brothers in 1835-6, and occupied, after the Wittenooms, by the Hicks family and the Cliftons (to whom the land still belongs).

There has now been significant progress. All the accumulated rubbish (and sheep droppings) have been cleared out, the pest control people have terminated three white ant nests discovered in the roof and nearby, the asbestos people have removed the asbestos sheeting used to fill in the verandah to make a sleep out and a work area outside the kitchen. The

photograph shows this kitchen work area - where one can imagine chooks being dispatched and de-feathered for dinner, wood cut into smaller pieces for the fires and the dinner bell rung to call the hands in for their meals. Work begins next week on the roof, replacing the corroded iron with new iron sheeting - at which time we will be able to see how much of the original shingle roof remains. We will keep you posted.

From the Battye Library collections

The following interesting snippet has been sent to us from the Battye Archivist, David Whiteford.

Battye Library immortalised in Eneabba cave

The Weelawadgi Cave, 11 miles west of Eneabba, was known from at least as early as 1910 but it wasn't until 1969 that a full survey was made of it, discovering nearly 4,000 feet of passage and many interesting features. David C Lowry, his wife, and D Hos undertook the survey and named and photographed the features, Among them is:

"The Battye Library, with records of a long history of occupation by bats. The chamber has spectacular white masses of stalactites, stalagmites and columns, which make an attractive contrast with the dark smoothly undulating floor of sand and guano. It is probably the finest display of formation in any cave north of Perth" (as described by David Lowry in *Western Caver* v9 #5, Sept-Oct 1969).

A September 2009 report on the cave is published in the Cave Exploration

Group (South Australia) Inc. newsletter CEGSA 216. News edition 2009. Paul Nov. Hosie led a group of cavers who undertook some cleaning and maintenance οf the cave. It is a gated cave and approval to access it must be obtained from the Department of Environment Conservation. A copy of

Basedow, Herbert. *Narrative of an expedition of exploration in North-West Australia*. Carlisle, W.A.: Hesperian Press, 2009.(The Western Australian Explorers' Diaries Project). [This journal of the 1916 expedition describes

the geology, flora, fauna and Aboriginal peoples of the west coast of the Kimberley frontier and the Wyndham.]

Clunies-Ross, John C. *The Clunies-Ross chronicle*. Imprint: John Clunies-Ross, 2009. [The chronicle details 150 years of the settlement and evolution of the Cocos Island community and the Clunies-Ross family.]

Hetherington, Penelope. *Paupers, poor relief and poor houses in Western Australia 1929-1910.* Crawley, W.A.: UWA Publishing, 2009. [The story of poor relief in Western Australia intersects closely with the stories of convicts and assisted immigrants. Discusses the system of nineteenth century poor relief in Western Australia, illustrating the states social, economic and political history.]

One small port: three names. A history of the Dongara Port. Compiled by the Irwin District Historical Society Inc, 2009. [History of the Dongara Maritime Industry.]

Persistence in faith: a history of St Marks Anglican Church Bassendean, Western Australia 1909-2009. Bassendean, W.A.: St Marks Anglican Church Council, 2009. [Traces 100 years of history of the St Marks Church and the Church of England (later the Church of England in Australia and then the Anglican Church of Australia in Bassendean.]

Shellam, T. Shaking hands on the fringe: negotiating the Aboriginal world at King Georges Sound. Crawley, W.A. University of Western Australia, 2009. [This ethnographic history narrates cross-cultural stories of the developing relationships between British and Aboriginal individuals after the British established a garrison at King Georges Sound Albany in 1826.]

Willing, J. & Ferguson, Beth. *Full steam ahead: Bunbury Port Authority* 1909-1995. Bunbury, W.A.: Bunbury Port Authority, 2009. [The story of men who built a port which, after a century of growth and innovation, has become a model for responsible and successful port operations.]

Yiannakis, John N. Odysseus in the golden west: Greek migration, settlement and adaptation in Western Australia since 1947. Waterford, W.A.: API Network, 2009. The *Police Gazette of Western Australia* (1876 onwards) is a valuable resource for researching police and criminals in Western Australia. Information can be found under various headings: apprehensions (name of person arrested, arresting constable, charge and sentence); police appointments, dismissals, discharges, promotions, resignations and transfers; tickets of leave, certificates of freedom, and conditional pardons issued to convicts; physical descriptions of prisoners etc.


Soul searching: A user's guide to the Western Australian Legislative Assembly electoral rolls 1890 - 1967

This useful publication was compiled by Julie Martin, who was for many

years a senior librarian at the Battye Library, with the aid of a grant from the Friends of Battye Library.

In 1890, Western Australia was granted self government and a bicameral parliament (one with two Houses) was established. The Legislative Assembly or Lower House provided the Government of the State whilst the Legislative Council or Upper House acted as a House of Review.

This guide is only to the Legislative Assembly electoral rolls, as most residents of Western Australia met the voting



qualifications for this House. Until 1963, a property qualification was required for those enrolling to vote in Legislative Council elections. The guide can be accessed from the Friends of Battye Library website at: http://www.friendsofbattyelibrary.org.au/Online%20Publications.htm

Jack's Back: Two fascinating relics of a theatre long gone

Once again I invite the reader to share in one of my own fields of historical interest, namely matters theatrical. Specifically, to focus on two very different works of art that once decorated the mezzanine foyer of the Capitol Theatre, Perth's leading cinema in its early years, the Capitol stood at the foot of William Street from 1929 to 1967.

One of these pieces is the buff-coloured marble bust of the film star Rudolph Valentino, who enjoyed widespread fame and adulation as the great lover in the era of the silent screen. Some emphasis is given to



this item as part of 'Show Stoppers', the current exhibition (no.39) presented by the Museum of Performing Arts at His Majesty's Theatre. Sculpted by an Italian artist, Professor Bessi, it was made for the actress Pola Negri, Valentino's last paramour, and is attached to a freestanding alabaster pedestal. The idol of millions of female fans, the actor was deeply mourned after his untimely death in 1926. Even in staid Perth, he obviously had his long-devoted admirers, for the staff at the Capitol often founded the sculpted face earing impressions of lipstick!

The second art feature is a much bigger affair - a pair of wooden casements, each 5.2 metres wide and 1.2 metres high, and each containing a set of coloured leadlight panels. These form panoramic depictions of Perth in about 1870 and 1928 respectively. They are on permanent display back-lit and mounted along a gallery wall within the Film and Television Institute at Fremantle. At the Capitol they used to adorn two curved loges or 'cosy corners' on either side of the central stairway that led from the mezzanine level to the dress circle and lounge seating.

The five panels were commissioned from Barnett Bros Ltd, Builders' suppliers, by Poole and Mouritzen, the archiects of the Temple Court complex (of which the Capitol was part); they were designed and executed by Arthur Clarke. When the buildings were eventually demolished, the panels were saved and relocated thanks to the efforts

of the Royal Western Australian Historical Society, the WA Museum, the WA Arts Council and their new host, the aforesaid FTI.

The first series of panels shows the young city as it would have appeared from the end of the William Street jetty- a succession of small buildings huddled together and dominated by the new Perth Town Hall. Interestingly, ten of its features are further identified by captions superimposed in tiny lettering. From left to right, they are William Street, the Old Pier, the Site of Temple Court, Sir James Lee Steere's residence, the Old Congregational Church, the Misses' Cameron school, the premises of A D Letch and of J J Mews, the Devonshire Arms Hotel and the Misses Camerons' residence.

A careful search could well reveal what photograph or other basis the artist used in designing this scene. What is most intriguing is why he gave such emphasis both to the Misses Camerons' school (which faced the Esplanade) and their residence (in Pier Street?). Were they his relatives, perhaps? It is also of present-day relevance to note the blue water of the Swan River lapping the southern edge of the street then as now called The Esplanade. Will it be made to return there?

the secondset of panels shows the scene from a more distant viewpoint, namely from Kings Park, with shrubbery in the foreground. The vista extends from the new Lord Forrest statue at left and sweeping all the way round to Mill Point at the right. This time there is little detail in the city itself, and it still has a low-level skyline but for a still lofty Town Hall. However, there are far fewer buildings shown in South Perth thanone would expect for the late 1920s.

This fine piece of artwork deserves to be better known generally. If visiting Fremantle on a weekday, Friends would do well to call in at the FTI, which leads of Princess May Park at 92 Adelaide Street (and just opposite the venerable Proclamation tree).

The archivist at His Majesty's has further avised that his Museum's exhibition no.41 (from July next) will be devoted to the Capitol's contemporary, the even more ornte Ambassadors Theatre, which entertained Perth from 1928 to 1972.

The Durack family have had major influences across Australia. It all began when a small branch of an Irish family tried to escape poverty in 1853. The State Library presents an exceptional exhibition on this pioneering family, showcasing the extensive collections of Durack material held by the Library together with material on loan from members of the Durack family. Featuring diaries, artworks, letters, notebooks, photographs, film, rare books, objects and more, the exhibition tells us some of the fortunes of this extraordinary family and their contribution to Western Australia.

Kalgoorlie CollectionsCare Regional Hub

SLWA has recently met with the coordinator of the new CollectionsCare Regional Hub in the Goldfields to discuss possible opportunities for working together. CollectionsCare aims to develop practical skills and knowledge of staff and volunteers of regional collecting institutions. SLWA will look at ways to work with the Hub to help local collecting organisations manage their collections and build cooperative working relationships.

Closing the Gap

Under the Commonwealth's Closing the Gap Strategy, SLWA will be delivering Information Literacy training in WA's remote Indigenous

communities. This will be a three year program, and will see SLWA staff working with Indigenous communities to improve literacy in all age groups.

From the collections

Rare stamp found

Volunteer Patrick Bunbury had a rare find when processing archival documents, Acc 712A/8 (Stone, James & Co.), recently – a Penny Black stamp. The stamp is attached to a letter, dated 29 July 1840 and addressed to Messrs Few Hamilton & Few, Henrietta Street, Covent Garden (London). The sender is Wm. Smith of 2 Francis Street, Golden Square, requesting payment for various goods.



Before gathering our belongings and disappearing into the sunset, Patrick and I thought we should 'do a Google' to find the stamp's worth - see if we were flying first class or business. We sadly unpacked our bags when we saw that used Penny Blacks are valued at anything from \$20 upwards to about \$2000, depending on the condition of the stamp.

"Our" Penny Black is in quite good condition, apart from having no left-side margin. A Penny Black with all margins intact is worth more than those with missing margins. This and many other interesting facts about the Penny Black can be found online in *Wikipedia* and various enthusiastic philatelic sites.

The stamp is safely and securely housed in Security Stack with a copy made for client use. Despite the lack of monetary value, it is still a significant item and has the added value of being a part of a complete, combined letter, and item of postal stationery (most letters at that time were sent folded and sealed, thus transforming into an envelope). According to Wikipedia, in the less than two years (1840-41) that the Penny Black was on issue, over 68 million stamps were printed, and with so many letters and other documents being kept, there are many

survivors of the stamp!

Margaret Medcalf Award

On the morning of 19 May 2010, the Hon John Day MLA, Minister for Planning: Culture and the Arts, accompanied by Margaret Medcalf OAM, presented this year's Margaret Medcalf Award to Kevin Fitzgerald and Chris Owen from the South West Aboriginal Land and Sea Council. The Award, including a prize of \$1000, was made for the book 'It's still in my heart, this is my Country': The Single Noongar Claim History, authored by the South West Aboriginal Land and Sea Council, John Host with Chris Owen.

Culture and the Arts Minister John Day recognised the contribution the work makes to the knowledge and history of native title in Western Australia, saying

"this book brings together evidence that was gathered as part of the

Single Noongar Claim Federal Court trial to provide a comprehensive account of Noongar people and their history. The judges felt this book had the potential to alter the path of historical Aboriginal research and that the work has led to a paradigm shift in the way Aboriginal culture and identity is defined and understood. The researchers spent several years reviewing thousands of records at the State Records Office, in addition to other evidence gathered as part of the Single Noongar Claim. The records included 19th century colonial archives about Aboriginal people in WA, the records of the State Native Welfare and Aborigines departments and the anthropological papers of Daisy Bates."

Special commendations were also awarded to two works:

Tiffany Shellam's paper - Enumerating the unknowable: imagining, counting and defining the politically relevant Aboriginal population of colonial Western Australia

Penelope Hetherington's book - Paupers, poor relief and poor houses in Western Australia, 1829-1910.

The judging panel for this year's Award comprised Associate Professor Jean Chetkovich, from the Centre for Western Australian History at The University of Western Australia, Justine McDermott, State Records Commissioner, and Cathrin Cassarchis, State Archivist and Director State Records

Geoffrey Bolton Lecture 2010

The speaker at the 2010 Geoffrey Bolton Lecture will be Emeritus Professor David Black AM, Chairman of the Parliamentary History Advisory Committee at the Parliament of Western Australia. The Lecture will be held at the Government House Ballroom at 6pm on Monday 20 September 2010. The date has been chosen to coincide with a parliamentary sitting week. The topic for this year's Lecture has not yet been finalised but Professor Black has stated that he sees the Lecture as an opportunity to explain what has been achieved in parliamentary and general political history in Western Australia, with particular reference to the State's archives.

SRO Seminars

The most recent speaker at a SRO Lunchtime Seminar was Isla Macphail who spoke about her 2009 Margaret Medcalf Award winning publication titled *Highest Privilege and Bounden Duty: A study of Western Australian parliamentary elections 1829-1901*, published by the Western Australian Electoral Commission. Isla spoke eloquently about her topic, making what seems at first to be a somewhat dry academic subject, come vividly to life, underlying the use of a great deal of archival material from the State Archives collection in the production of the work.

The next Lunchtime Seminar will mark NAIDOC week and will occur on 6 July 2010. Featuring Dr Mary Ann Jebb, the seminar is titled "Community history and 'Mowanjum 50 years'" and is about this lively and interesting work produced to mark the 50th anniversary of the Mowanjum Aboriginal Community. The book is richly illustrated and uses oral and archival sources to describe the people, culture and country of Mowanjum in the Kimberley region. The seminar will occur in the South West Room at the SRO.

1979 State Cabinet Records released

Each year the State Records Office organises the official release of the State Cabinet Records from their 30 year restriction access period, on or near Western Australia's Foundation Day – a day chosen because it

marks the commencement of government in Western Australia. This year a Guide to the 1979 State Cabinet Records was produced and promoted, resulting in newspaper, television and radio coverage of some of the issues highlighted in the State Cabinet Records from 30 years ago.

1979 was the year Western Australia made international headlines when Skylab fell to earth near Esperance, and the Miss Universe contest was held at the Entertainment Centre in Perth. The 1979 State Cabinet records reveal the concerns of Sir Charles Court's government about various issues, including: the actions taken to provide relief to drought ravaged farmers and victims of the Cadoux earthquake, the consideration of sites for a possible nuclear power plant, deliberations about oil drilling on Noonkanbah Station and about Aboriginal Land Rights generally, discussions about the abolition of the Marriage Allowance for public servants, the release of an Energy Policy for Western Australia, discussions about proposed Sex Discrimination legislation and discussions about Nude Bathing at Swanbourne.

1979 was also the year of the 'sesquicentennial' anniversary of British

settlement in Western Australia, and the State Cabinet Records show the deliberations by the Government about the use of the 'WAY 79' logo and celebratory events that occurred during that year including; Prince Charles' visit, the Parmelia Yacht Race, the Military Tattoo, and a 150th anniversary Golf Tournament. Western Australia was certainly in a 'state of excitement' throughout 1979.

Historical maps online

Over 5000 historical maps have been made available online since funding

from the Friends of Battye Library (Inc) was granted for this project late last year. Only 250 more maps are awaiting loading to the system and these require futher descriptive work forst. This will then complete this project.

Anna and Thomas Leonowens in Western Australia, 1853-1857

Anna Leonowens was the almost mythical 19th century Governess to the King of Siam's children, portrayed in the 20th century bestselling book *Anna and the King of Siam* (1944) and the Rodgers and Hammerstein musical *The King and I* (1951) which were both later turned into Hollywood films. Much has been written about Anna and the State Records Office has recently published an *Occasional Paper*, authored by distinguished American biographer Alfred Habegger and SRO Senior Archivist Gerard Foley, titled *Anna and Thomas Leonowens in Western Australia*, 1853-1857.

This paper reveals the little known facts about their time in Western Australia. This includes the story of their perilous journey to Western Australia from Singapore, the record of Anna Leonowens advertising to be the teacher of a 'seminary for young ladies' in Perth, Thomas's strong opinions recorded in the Minutes of the Swan River Mechanics Institute and the story of the family's life in the remote convict outpost of Lynton, north of Geraldton. The true story is every bit as remarkable as the Hollywood version of Anna's life, but the truth has always had difficulty coming to light. Unfortunately, for various reasons, Anna concealed her early life, never revealing to anyone that she spent four years in Western Australia, preferring instead to say that time was spent in the more salubrious surrounds of St James Square in London.

Dear Editor

Your 'Have you a story to tell?' in the recent newsletter prompts me to recount the following tiny snippet which I would like to share with your readers.

Recently I was reflecting on my earliest visit to the Public Library [now the State Library of Western Australia] in the early 1940s. In those days my father wrote brief broadcasts for the Australian Broadcasting Commission on English poets and authors, touching on their style and subsequent influence on English literature.

His research necessitated visits to the Library, always on a Sunday afternoon, during which he and Dr Battye would engage in long discussions on topics far above my comprehension. On my first visit there with my father, Battye, seeing the look of boredom on my face, asked, "Would you like to look in the back room where lots of other books are stacked?". He then took me over to the door, opened it and switched on the lights. All I could at first see were long dark corridors barely lit by two sixty-watt globes which struggled to serve each gloomy alley. Battye closed the door behind him and I was left to my own devices.

As my eyes became used to the darkness, my imagination soon dreamed up visions of foreign spies armed with guns waiting around the next corner, whom I silently crept upon to defeat, and having despatched them, sought further adventures in the next dark canyon. When it was time to leave, Dr Battye asked, "Did you enjoy looking at the books?", to which I mumbled an unconvincing reply. In the


past forty years I have made countless visits to the Library, but none have matched the excitement, danger and death in that back room almost seventy years ago!.

Police Gazette of Western Australia (1876 to 1889, 1899 - 1900)

The *Police Gazette of Western Australia* (1876 onwards) is a valuable resource for researching police and criminals in Western Australia.

Information can be found under various headings: apprehensions (name of person arrested, arresting constable, charge and sentence); police appointments, dismissals, discharges, promotions, resignations and



transfers; tickets of leave, certificates of freedom, and conditional pardons issued to convicts; physical descriptions of prisoners etc.

With thanks to the Friends of Battye Library and the Sholl Bequest, the *Police Gazettes* 1876-1900 have been digitised and are fully text searchable. www.slwa.wa.gov.au/find/western_australian/police_gazettes

Soul searching: A user's guide to the Western Australian Legislative Assembly electoral rolls 1890 - 1967

This useful publication was compiled by Julie Martin, who was for many years a senior librarian at the Battye Library, with the aid of a grant from the Friends of Battye Library.

In 1890, Western Australia was granted self government and a bicameral parliament (one with two Houses) was established. The Legislative Assembly or Lower House provided the Government of the State whilst the Legislative Council or Upper House acted as a House of Review.

This guide is only to the Legislative Assembly electoral rolls, as most residents of Western Australia met the voting qualifications for this House. Until 1963, a property qualification was required for those enrolling to vote in Legislative Council elections. Jack's Back: On the trail of the Leonowens

It is a pleasing development to see Occasional Paper No.1 lately put out by the State Records Office and that on the intriguing topic of Thomas and Anna Leonowens and their stay in Western Australia in the 1850s (see page 12 of this issue). Some reflections concerning this little piece of our history went into this column of mine in our Newsletter no.128 of May 2008.

It is quite opportune for me to revisit the subject in consequence of a brief holiday I recently enjoyed at Penang in Malaysia. I was already aware that Thomas Leonowens had died there in 1859, and so I soon sought out his grave in the old Christian cemetery. Actually, his is one of some twenty-five noteworthy names to which the visitor's attention is drawn on a large signboard that has stood near the main gate since 1993 as part of the Penang Heritage Trail. At the grave the inscription is on one side of the monumental superstructure of brick and stone: 'Sacred to the memory of Thomas Leonowens who departed this life on the 7th of May 1859 aged 31 years & 5 days. Lord have mercy.'

According to the authors of the Occasional Paper, previous research has

shown that the deceased really should have been aged 35 in 1859, but Gerard Foley has since reminded me that they have found quite a few such discrepancies in their pursuit of Anna's whole trail! In her own 'autobiography'

published in 1870 she made no mention at all of the four years the couple had spent in Western Australia in the decade before her time in Bangkok. And the new Paper only takes the story up to the point when Thomas and Anna left here for Singapore in 1857.

This is also a convenient occasion to produce a relevant item that I came across long ago. It shows that Anna's stay here was not altogether forgotten by our colonists in 1870, as indicated by a piece in the Fremantle newspaper *The Express* of 15th October that year. Under the heading, 'Death of a Buddhist king', it quoted a lengthy report on King Mongkut in his dying days in 1868 (of which just a portion follows here):

'The following interesting account is we have been given to understand from the pen of an English Lady named Leonowens who has been governess at the Siamese Court, and formerly resided in this colony.

...On the day before his death he called to his bedside his nearest relatives, and parted among them such of his personal effects as were most prized by him... In the evening he wrote with his own hand a tender farewell to the mothers of his many children, - eighty-nine in number. On the morning of his last day, he summoned his royal half-brother Wongsah, the Prime Minister and others, and solemnly imposed on them the care of his eldest son, the Chowfa Chulalon Korn and his kingdom; at the same time expressing his last earthly wish, that the Senabawdee [i.e. the Accession Council] in electing his successor, would give their voices for one who should conciliate all parties, that the country might not be distracted by dissensions on that question...

Then turning his gaze upon a small image of his adored Teacher [i.e. Buddha], he seemed for some time absorbed in awful contemplation. "Such is life!" Those were actually the last words of this most remarkable Buddhist king... That very night, without disorder or debate, the Senabawdee elected his eldest son...to succeed him... The title of the present supreme king (my amiable and very promising scholar) is Prabat Somdetch Phra Paramendr Maha Chulalonkorn Kate Clou Cheu-yu-Hua. – "The English Governess at the Siamese Court" in the Atlantic Monthly.

Anna's promising pupil went on to prove an able and progressive ruler and reigned till his death in 1910. He was the grandfather of Thailand's much revered monarch of today, the aged and ailing King Bhumibol.

A word from our President.

Dear Friends

Exciting news this month, your committee has just approved a Battye Library project for the 2009 Sholl Bequest Funds (yes 2009 – 2010 has not come in yet – the Trustees take time!). The project is to digitise the Western Australian Biographical Index (WABI) cards, and to create a user search function on the State Library's website. This means that the WABI cards will be fully searchable on your own computer, and can provide valuable information relating to dates of births, deaths and marriages of family members, date of arrival in Western Australia, where they lived and occupation, etc. Of course some of this information – which mainly came from family members

contributing to Rica Erickson's gigantic biographical project – may not be accurate. But most of it will be and will be a huge help to those beginning to search their family trees. What about the Dictionaries? - I hear some of you asking. The idea is to progress to the Bi-Centennial Dictionary set after the cards are safely filmed. The card collection takes up a lot of space and is deteriorating with constant use so they must be our first priority. They also contain information that has been added since 1988!

Another big plus to come from the use of our Sholl Bequest funds is the *Maps online* project undertaken by the State Records Office – there are now over 6000 maps available on line to help our researchers – and if you look at any of these maps do not forget the zoom button which lets you get a highly magnified look at particular portions of maps. You can see comments by the surveyors and the names of landmarks, which are often difficult to read on the whole map.

We are also pleased to announce that Lindsey Peet, whom many of you saw when he was made our 2009 Gem of time, has been able to join your committee thanks to the State Library organising a teleconference set-up — which worked very well in its first application earlier this month. He was able to contribute to one of the tabled issues — viz the RSL seeking advice on its archive holdings. Lindsay's long commitment to the library and his wealth of historical experience will be of enormous help to your committee.

I hope to see as many of you as possible at our September meeting where June Caunt will be speaking about post war immigration – something we all know a little about!

State Library News

New Collections

The State Library's heritage collection in the Battye Library has been enriched by several significant donations, including:

- Photographs of daily life at Sunset Hospital, 1960s.

- Letterbook of H M Deakin 1898-1899.
- Oral history interviews of Subiaco RSL sub-branch members.
- Papers of Charles Harcourt Smith 1928-1967 (farmer at Koorda).
- Papers of Governor Professor Gordon Reid.

Note: some of these collections have not been processed or re-housed etc, so may not be accessible to researchers yet.

Jean Chetkovich joins the State Library

In late August, Dr Jean Chetkovich will be joining the staff of the State Library of Western Australia. Jean will be known to many Friends of Battye Library members as an historian and the former Director of the Centre for Western Australian History. Jean will be part of the State Library's Collection Development team with specific responsibility for the collecting of original Western Australian materials. Jean's title will be 'Collection Liaison: Original Materials'. A key part of her role will be to build on the work of the team in seeking and acquiring West Australian heritage material and to promote the State Library's role in preserving and making accessible West Australia's documentary heritage.

With the contacts and experience Jean has built through her involvement in the Centre for Western Australian History at the University of Western Australia, on various Boards and in developing or commissioning West Australian history publications, such as Studies in Western Australian History and the Historical Encyclopedia of Western Australia, Jean will be a tremendous asset in this role.

Digitisation

Within the Library's annual digitisation program the State Library has digitised over 23,600 images in the last year. Some important items digitised over the past year include the RAC Year Book and Road Guide 1917-1930, Lands and Surveys Historic Map Series 1880-1890s, Western Table Talk, Society Magazine 1897, illuminated addresses presented to the Governor, Sir Gerard Smith, 1895-1908 and the Badjaling/Winmar collection of photographs.

In addition to the annual reformatting plan, late last year the Library commenced a project to conserve and digitise some 2500 architectural drawings of The Krantz and Sheldon architectural firm, which was established in the early 1930's and made a significant contribution to the architectural history of Western Australia. With some external funding sourced through the Heritage Council, the Library has been able to conserve and digitise part of this extensive collection, making it accessible via the online catalogue.

Closing the Gap

As reported in the last newsletter, the State Library is involved with the National Partnership Agreement on Remote Indigenous Public Internet Access, also referred to as Closing the Gap. The project seeks to improve access to the internet for Indigenous communities in WA through the provision of upgraded technology and infrastructure for remote regions. The State Library has developed and implemented flexible training programs for computer skills and information literacy to support and enhance the use of the new technology. In addition, the State Library uses the opportunity to digitally repatriate photographs of cultural significance from our collection.

Earlier this year, State Library staff visited the Ngaanyatjarra Lands in the Western Desert region of WA to deliver training in the communities of Wingellina, Blackstone and Warakurna. Training was delivered in partnership with Ngaanyatjarra Media who was contracted to deliver training in all twelve communities within the Ngaanyatjarraku Shire for the first year of the program. In September the State Library will embark on the second year of the program that will see staff delivering training in five communities in the West Kimberley region, including Jarlmadangah Burru, Mowanjum, One Arm Point, Djarindjin and Bidyadanga.

Better Beginnings

Since 2005, the State Library, Rio Tinto and Western Australian local governments have partnered to provide *Better Beginnings*, working with families and communities to support children's early literacy and learning and provide successful school readiness strategies.

Rio Tinto is currently funding a 12 month pilot to build on and embed the successful strategies of *Better Beginnings* with an extension delivering early literacy resources and support for children aged four and five years when they begin their formal education. Pilot centres include 23 remote indigenous communities in the Kimberley, Pilbara, Gascoyne and Western Desert.

This year's State budget included funding of \$6.8 million, including \$2.8 million from Royalties for Regions, over four years to improve and extend the program throughout Western Australia.

This funding will roll-out *Better Beginnings* to the families of children from birth to age five over the next four years.

State Records Office News

State Records Commission Award

The State Records Commission Award for excellence, (in reporting compliance with the State Records Act 2000 in annual reports by government agencies), was presented by the Director, State Records Office (SRO) to the Fremantle Port Authority on 17 June 2010. This Award is one of a suite of Special Awards within the W S Lonnie Awards, which are sponsored by the Institute of Public Administration of Australia.

Historical Maps Online project

Approximately 6000 existing digital images of early Lands Department maps and plans are now accessible online, following the implementation between December 2009 and June this year, of a project funded by the Sholl bequest, (through the Friends of Battye Library). New images of archival plans will be added to the SRO's online catalogue (AEON), when they are produced through the SRO's digitisation program; which is progressed in collaboration with the State Library's Preservation Services Branch.

Geoffrey Bolton Lecture

Distinguished Parliamentary Historian Emeritus Professor David Black AM will deliver the 2010 Geoffrey Bolton Lecture on Monday evening 20 September 2010 at 6pm.

Professor Black is the Chairman of the Parliamentary History Advisory Committee of the Parliament of Western Australia and has written and edited more than twenty works about the history of representative democracy in Australia, including the definitive biographies of Western Australia's parliamentary representatives. Commentating in the media for many years, Professor Black has become a well known authority on Western Australian politics and elections.

Have you a story to tell?

The surname of Colonial Secretary Peter Brown / Broun

This short article deals with the background to the reason why Western Australia's first Colonial Secretary Peter Brown changed his surname to Broun , and is based on my discussions with Mr James Nicholas (Nick) Broun of Beverley (who is the most senior member of the family in WA) and my reading on the subject.

Walterus le Brun moved from France to Scotland in about 1120 , taking up residence at Colstoun north of Haddington .

In 1360 Sir John changed the surname of the

family to Broun, which continued for several centuries.

The family "backed the wrong side "in the 1745 Rebellion in which Bonnie Prince Charlie (Prince Charles Edward Stuart, "the Young Pretender") failed in his attempt to win the English and Scottish thrones. In view of the ill-feeling of the British against the French, and people with French names, members of the Broun family changed their name to Brown.

Thus, when Peter was born at Guernsey, Channel Islands in 1797 and arrived in the Swan River Colony as Colonial Secretary in the Parmelia in 1829, his surname was Brown.

By the 1840s , the family had no reason to fear any adverse reaction or prejudice against a French surname . There are several documents prior to 1843 in which the Colonial Secretary's signature is plainly P. Broun That spelling was used in his signature at the foot of the Estimates for 1843 .

A notice by the Colonial Secretary about land selection was signed on 19 September 1844 as "Peter Broun". When that notice was published in the *Inquirer* on 25 September 1844, Broun's name was followed by an asterisk which directed the readers' attention to an announcement at the foot of that page that the Colonial Secretary had adopted the spelling Broun, being the orthography in use by the head of the family (ie. the baronet in Scotland). The name Brown was never reverted to.

The 13th baronet Sir William Windsor Broun, a fourth generation Australian, died in Sydney in 2007. The baronetcy then passed to his nephew who became Sir Wayne Broun of Colstoun and Thorniedykes in Scotland, and who lives in the Sydney suburb of Warriewood.

[Pamela Statham Drew attended a recent seminar held at the Royal Western Australian Historical Society and we are indebted to her for the following report.]

'Beadwork is forever'

On Tuesday 10th August Valerie Carvill held 60 odd ladies in the palm of her hand while she spoke about the magic of beads and beadwork.

Sponsored by the Royal Western Australian Historical Society Auxilliary, participants walked in to see a table at the back of the room literally laden with cakes and other scrumptious goodies. Then, surrounded by the society's amazing collection of beaded dresses and bags and a special exhibition put up by the Bead Guild of WA, Valerie began her talk.

Beads were used by the very earliest civilisations - including our Aboriginal peoples. Only a few

years ago three perforated beads made of kangaroo bone were found in an archaeological dig at Devils Lair in W.A. which proved to be between 17,000 and 19,000 years old – older than the oldest known American Indian beads.

Most people know that the Egyptians used beads in their burial practices but it was a surprise to learn how many cultures have used beads, and the variety of purposes for which they were used: as a sign of wealth and status, especially among African women; as potent protection against illness, or in Tibet against falling; as a religious object such as the Rosary; as a good luck charm and of course everywhere simply for their beauty and ornamentation. And the variety of different kinds of beads she spoke of - and showed us in specially prepared boards – is mind-blowing: she had beans made of bone, wood, coral, glass, crystal, china, clay, amber, jet, various precious stones, pearls – real and artificial, plastic and steel. They also came in a large variety of shapes: large and small, round and oblong, single and joined, plain and decorated.

A RWAHS member, Helen Treloar, a neighbour of Valerie's, contributed a number of pieces to the exhibition including a beaded green snake made by Turkish prisoners in 1919. Valerie had previously told us that Turkey had given its name to the wonderful blue stone, Turquoise, which was one of the earliest materials used for beads. It had been mined in the Sinai desert but exported to Turkey where it was highly valued for its range of colour from light blue to deep green. Amber beads - from a light honey colour to dark red - were also used by ancient man. They came mainly from the Baltic and were believed to have healing properties. Coral beads found in ancient burial sites were supposed to bring good-luck – particularly at sea, to stop bleeding and fend off bronchitis. We learned that specific types of beads, and colours, could have very different meanings.

In finishing up Valerie made her audience laugh by holding up a string of 1960s plastic pop-beads – a fashion that came and went – but still part of a collection that proves beads themselves will go on forever.

East Perth Cemeteries Project

The site for a burial ground was surveyed at East Perth in late 1829, and the first acknowledged burial was John Mitchell on 6 January 1830. The cemeteries within the grounds continued to be the main burial ground for the Perth area until April 1899 when burials commenced at Karrakatta Cemetery.

The East Perth Cemeteries burial ground were closed for new burials in 1899, except for those in vaults or with the approval of the Governor. Burials at East Perth continued until 1916 when this practiced was ceased with a handful of exceptions.

It is widely acknowledged that there are over 10,000 burials within the grounds of the East Perth Cemeteries; approximately 3500 of these burials are recorded. There was no burial register kept by either the Church Wardens or the caretakers of the Cemeteries. This led to researchers have spending many hours compiling various histories and datasets on the East Perth Cemeteries and these have been produced in various formats.

Cherie Strickland and Lorraine Clarke with the help of funding from the Friends of Battye Library Inc. are collating a database of the numerous datasets and will carry out further research into other documents and family histories to enable the most comprehensive biographical database on the inhabitants of Cemetery Hill.

In partnership with the National Trust (WA), the Friends of Battye Library aim to make this research available freely online. This database would be fully sourced and would acknowledge all previous researchers who contributed to the end result.

We would like to thank National Trust, Royal West Australian Historical Society, West Australian Genealogical Society, Graham Bown, Ron Bodycoat, Father Edward Doncaster, Gillian O'Mara and Anglican Archives for their support in this endeavour.

Jack's Back: Brevities and foretastes

Three different topics vied for coverage here this time!

First then, I hope that some keen Friends were among the visitors who enjoyed the latest display by the Museum of Performing Arts at His Majesty's Theatre. In some 120 photos, it has shown the ornate architecture and décor that was the Ambassadors Theatre, and also stills of the lavish 'presentations' staged there in its early years. It was demolished in 1972, and so nowadays many a viewer under fifty can scarcely believe that Perth once had such a remarkable picture theatre. Incidentally, Battye also holds some excellent scenes of the Ambassadors, and notably an 'album' of 37 shots that came from the photographic firm Illustrations Ltd.

Next I saw the opportunity of reporting that our Newsletter number 131 of November 2008 had met with a pleasing reception in the English village of Gautby in Lincolnshire. In that issue I mentioned this was the parish where the Reverend Edward Millett finally served after his five years here at York in the 1860s. Both he and his wife are buried at Gautby so when a member of their local Heritage Society googled the word 'Gautby' on her computer a while back, she eventually came up with that item of Jack's Back compiled in the antipodes. She then sought and received our permission to make use of the piece in a forthcoming publication of their Society. I have now decided we should wait until we hear further news from England and make a full story of it.

Thirdly, I considered putting together a page on Sir Benjamin Pine. For apparently he is now recognised as having been Western Australia's Governor for a time in 1868-69, though he never actually came here. And thus I find he appears as eighth of the potted biographies in Western Australia's Governors and Premiers, a glossy booklet of 62 pages put out by the Constitutional Centre in 2002. However, that topic too warrants holding over for further investigation and fuller treatment in a future Newsletter.


Outpost to City

Writing the history of the Armadale district

For the past three years, Jennie and Bevan have been working on a commission from the City of Armadale to research and write the history of the district from its earliest beginnings as a remote soldiers' outpost

in Kelmscott in 1830 to its present day position as one of Perth's largest and fastest growing suburbs. Along the way there have been some interesting discoveries made about the history of Armadale, a couple of myths busted, and just a few controversies stirred.

Jennie has an Honours in History from the University of Western Australia, and graduate qualifications in



Library and Information studies from Curtin University. She is the author of *Bassendean: A social history 1829 to 1979* which was commissioned and published by the Bassendean Town Council. Before retiring from the State Library in 2007, she managed the archival collections of the Battye Library, then spent two years as Director of the Battye Library prior to completing her career as Battye Librarian and manager of the State Library's Subject Specialists team.

Bevan has degrees in science and education from Sydney University. For many years he has pursued his interest in family history including a stint as President of the Western Australian Genealogical Society. He is the author and publisher of books on conservation, botany, and history, his most recent works being From Norfolk poacher to Northam farmer: the life, times, and descendents of Robert Carter and Phoebe Oxbury and Nyungah Land: Records of invasion and theft of Aboriginal land on the Swan River 1829-1850.

What's New at the State Library

Exhibitions

National Family History Week

National Family History Week was celebrated at the State Library during the first week in August with a range of presentations, tours and training. Presentations were given by staff of the Library, the State Records Office, the National Archives and the State Library Foundation as well as by members of the Western Australian Genealogical Society and individual historians and genealogists. Over 550 participants attended and much positive feedback was received. Sessions were aimed at both beginners and more experienced family historians and the diverse topics included child migration, hidden treasures at the Library, group settlement, poor laws in the UK, women and the regiment, Aboriginal family history, English prison records, caring for family photographs and the 'Our Page in History' website. There were also presentations which followed a specific family, showing the type of information which can be found; Ian Simon told the story of his ancestor, Charles Herring, who lived in both Narrogin and South Australia while Cindy Solonec presented the story of her father, Francisco Casanova-Rodriguez, who came to the Kimberley from Spain and married a Nygkina woman.

Oral Historical Records Rescue Group (OHRRG)

As you probably know last year the \$849,000 Lotterywest grant was received by the Friends of Battye Library and will be managed by a combined stakeholder group, OHRRG. The Committee is represented by members of the Friends of Battye Library, the Oral History Association of Australia WA Branch, the Professional Historians Association and the Royal Western Australian Historical Society.

Since the first payment of \$49,000 was received in October last year we have had little news to report except ,after hours of work ,the most at risk tapes have been identified to save to digital format.

After unavoidable delays, we are pleased to announce that the OHRRG has received this update from Alison Sutherland, Director Resource Services, SLWA

"You will be delighted to know that the construction of the sound studios is nearly complete, so the equipment will be on its way very shortly. Recruitment is also progressing, we nearly have a project manager, and have had a great response to the call for sound technicians".

The latest update is that preservation work will start in December.

State Records Office news

Friends Grant - Historical Maps Online project

Friends may recall that in the August 2010 newsletter we mentioned that approx 6000 digital images of early Lands Department maps and plans held by the State Records Office (SRO) may now be viewed online, via the SRO's website. This was achieved through the SRO's Maps Online Project, which was funded by the Sholl Bequest.

Between October 2009 (when Maps Online was launched) and June 2010, there were 13,785 visits to these images on the SRO website.

Geoffrey Bolton Lecture

Over 200 people attended this year's Bolton lecture at the Government House Ballroom, on the evening of Monday 20 September 2010. Professor David Black spoke on the topic Parliament, the People and Archives: Documenting Politics in Western Australia. In his address Professor Black emphasised that it was important for the State's archives to be appropriately identified and accessible so that historians and other social commentators could consult all available documentary evidence in assessing the nature and motivations behind significant government and parliamentary decisions. State Records Commission News

The Recordkeeping Services team at SRO have recently completed a fully revised version of the General Disposal Authority (GDA) for Local Government Records, and also Guidelines for the Authority's implementation .Once the State Records Commission has signed off on this disposal authority, the SRO expects to publish the GDA and the attendant Guidelines in late November this year.

The State Records Commission will next meet at Albany on 19 November 2010. The Commission normally convenes four times a year, and one of these meetings is held in regional Western Australia. Have you a story to tell?

Beards and WA Settlers.

Many of the photographs of early WA settlers show them to have full, even generous beards. This certainly applies to Gerald De Courcy Lefroy, whose extant photographs show him with a very full beard. His elder brother Anthony O'Grady, who came with De Courcy to Western Australia in 1844, has a similar full beard in an undated photograph of them together. Photography in something akin to the modern form commenced in Europe in the 1850's and it is probable the joint Lefroy brother's photograph dates from the late 1850's, at the very earliest.

Much later, when Anthony was Colonial Treasurer he retained a beard,

although closer to the 'Van Dyke' style.

The Journal of Gerald De Courcy Lefroy (Hesperian Press 2009) reports that De Courcy, who first established himself as a farmer settler, commenced a moustache on 11 April 1846, making it virtually certain he was previously clean shaven. His Journal subsequently refers to him shaving (9 August 1846, 6 June 1848 and 22 March 1849) although it is unclear whether he retained his moustache.

It seems likely that in the 1840's clean-shavenness was general. The frequent pictorial representations of well bearded settlers (and policemen), are taken after the early 1850's, and it seemed likely this may have owed something to a change of fashion, akin to the appearance of long hair among 'Teddy Boys' in the UK in the 1950's and 1960's. Their long hair was in part a reaction to the short hair-styles necessitated by the 1939-1945 war.

While engaged on work for the State Records Office recently I found letter 3740/2 dated 18 July 1864 (in 1156, C37) in which the police request the Comptroller-General of Convicts to ensure that the convict members of Road Parties have their hair and beards kept short, because when their hair and/or beards grew long, the police were unable to readily distinguish the convicts from the settlers. The Comptroller-General, while sympathetic, did not believe the police request to be practical in the circumstances of the country based road parties.

The police request makes it likely that the coming of clean shaven, short-haired convicts from 1850 onwards (so 'dressed' for both recognition and hygiene purposes) gradually caused settlers to distinguish themselves from the convicts by growing full beards and long hair. It is in this 'distinctive' free settler guise that the photographs of De Courcy and Anthony Lefroy were taken.

Book reviews

Australia's Magna Carta

(Published by the Department of the Senate, Canberra ACT, 2010.)

The Magna Carta ("the Great Charter"), the most famous document in the history of the English-speaking world, was executed by King John in 1215. It sets out concessions granted by the King to the Church, the Barons, and free men living under royal rule. As the principles stated are of fundamental significance in law and define the relationship between the King and his subjects, the Charter is the foundation of English (and Australian) constitutional law.

The Charter was re-issued with slightly varied contents in 1216, 1217, 1225, 1297 and 1300. The text of each was copied out by hand, so that each County and major town would receive and proclaim the Charter. An estimated 300 – 500 individual copies of the Charters were prepared longhand by scribes and distributed throughout England. They were nevertheless "original" Magna Cartas. Today, only 22 are still in existence. Of these, only two (both the 1297 version) are held outside the UK, one in Parliament House, Canberra, and the other in the National Archives, Washington, USA. The USA document was bought in 1984 for US\$1.5 million and sold to the National Archives in 2007 for US\$21.3 million.

The 35-page booklet under review contains an excellent article by Nicholas Vincent, a Professor of Medieval History in England, in which he discusses in detail two very interesting questions: how the Charter came to be bought in 1952 by Australia, and how the Charter, issued to Surrey County in 1297, came to be found in 1936 in the possession of King's School, Somerset, some 100 miles away from Surrey.

In 1936 a master at King's School found the Charter in a desk. The British Library was keen to acquire the document, but it was prepared to pay only £2,000 – £2,500. Sotheby's valued it at £10,000 plus £2,500 selling commission. Australia learnt of its availability and made attempts to buy it. An export licence was required before it could be sold to an overseas buyer. Eventually, after intrigue and long deliberations, an export licence was granted, an Australian import licence was approved , and the purchase was made at the price of £12,500.

The full explanation as to how King's School acquired the Charter will never be known. In 2007, facts became known which partly explain how the Charter came into the possession of the school well before its discovery there in 1936. A miscatalogued and previously unnoticed copy of the 1297 Forest Charter came to light in the British Library. It

was obviously a companion piece to the 1297 Magna Carta bought by Australia in 1952. It formed part of a small collection of documents gifted to the British Museum (later the British Library) in 1905 by a solicitor upon the death of his father who conducted his law practice 20 miles from King's School. Professor Vincent has concluded that in 1297 the Magna Carta and the Forest Charter were sent to Surrey; that the County Sheriff had handed them to the nuns of Easebourne Priory for safe custody; after the dissolution of the monasteries in the 1530s, the documents passed into the possession of a family which in due course engaged the services of the solicitor; and at some time the 1297 Magna Carta escaped from the deed box at the practice by being lost, sold or given away, and found its way to King's School.

The booklet also contains a Latin to English translation by Professor Vincent of the 37 clauses of the 1297 Magna Carta, a four-page article "Preserving Magna Carta", and a three-page Glossary explaining the meaning of words and expressions used in the Charter.

Edmund Stirling Swan River Colony Pioneer: A Biography of the Editor of the Inquirer Newspaper Edmund John Stirling (1812 to 1897)

(By Patricia Reynolds and published by Perth Black Swan Press 2010

This is a fascinating small book. Edmund Stirling, a relative of the writer, arrived at Swan River in August 1830 aboard the *Edward Lombe* aged 18. Initially known as Edmund Starling, he was befriended on the ship by flamboyant and wealthy publisher Charles McFaull. Edmund consequently spent his first years in the colony learning the printing trade with the aid of the small Ruthven Press now in the Museum of WA. When an early partnership between McFaull and William Kernot Shenton was dissolved, Shenton sold his interest in the press to Francis Lochee who, with Edmunds help, continued to publish the *Chronicle* on the old Ruthven Press while McFaull, using a Stanhope Press introduced by

Governor Stirling, began the Perth Gazette.

In 1840, using a press imported by William Tanner, Edmund and Francis Lochee began the *Inquirer* newspaper, which provided spirited competition for the more 'establishment oriented' *Gazette*. Reynold's book has far more detail than this – including the fortunes of the notorious William Nairn Clark, but she primarily follows Edmund, whose name changed to Stirling around the time he married 16 year old Ethel Read and began working at the *Inquirer* – the start of a 50 year association.

When Lochee sold his interest Edmund worked as compositor and reporter for several individuals before taking over as publisher and editor himself in 1847. As editor Stirling gained considerable respect: his criticisms were well founded – even when aimed at the Governor himself. He became a pillar of society – a member of the Perth Trust, a director of the Geraldine Mining Company and a founding member of the WA Telegraph Co. in 1868. Indeed two of his sons, Horace and Lewis Stirling, were closely involved with the first telegraph relay stations. The oldest son, with help from others of Edmund and Ethel's eleven surviving children, took over the *Inquirer* when Edmund retired in 1876. He did not stop contributing however, producing the very valuable *Brief History Of Western Australia From First Settlement* in 1894. Unfortunately he died before completing the second volume– passing away in York on 2 November 1897.

This is a book all those interested in WA's early years will want to add to their shelves, although most will regret the lack of an index

Jack's Back: Vale: Randolph Stow, Our 'Mick'

I am glad to have this column for adding my own piece to the many

tributes that have come forth to honour Randolph (Mick) Stow since his death in May. He and I were fellow students at secondary school and university in the halcyon days of the 1950s. At school the budding writer impressed many of us with the crisp original contributions he fed into our rather dry and formal end-of-term magazine, *The Swan*. And in our final year at university we marvelled at his achieving publication of his first novel, *A Haunted Land*

Our newsletter is just the place to emphasise that local history and the geographical environment are basic components that Stow wove skilfully into his writings, especially his novels, as many a reviewer has noted. He was able to draw

a lot of material from the experiences of his own childhood and of his maternal forebears who were among the first to take up properties near Geraldton. His mother was a daughter of the Sewell family who were pioneers at Sandsprings, and her paternal grandmother was a sister of Major Logue, long the paterfamilias at Ellendale. Original papers of both the Sewells and the Logues were acquired for Battye by Mollie Lukis on a field trip in 1955, and detailed listings are set out as MN3 and MN11 respectively. It is very likely that Mick made use of some of these records when putting together that first book.

Less well-known generally are some fascinating details of Mick's paternal family history. In England the Stows came of an old farming family based near the town of Stowmarket in East Suffolk. In 1837 the Reverend Thomas Quinton Stow (1801-62) was commissioned to go out to Adelaide to be the first Congregational minister in the new colony. There his eldest son, Randolph (1828-78) pursued an outstanding public career in the realm of law and was followed in the legal profession by his son Francis (1869-1935), who came to Western Australia in 1903, and his grandson Cedric (1902-59). Clearly, Cedric's son Mick owes his baptismal name

to his great-grandfather, and in fact to earlier distinguished lineage in the New World.

Back in the 1820s in Suffolk, the young Congregational cleric had married Elizabeth, the daughter of William Eppes of Bristol and his wife Elizabeth nee Randolph, descendant of early settlers in the colony of Virginia. On the second of their four sons the couple bestowed another name well to the fore in Virginia, Jefferson; and indeed, President Jefferson's mother was also a Randolph by birth. In colonial South Australia, Jefferson Stow (1830-1908) was another noteworthy public figure. In 1864 he took part in the ill-starred survey expedition that sought to open up the Northern Territory. The next year he headed for home with six companions in a small open boat that brought them into Geraldton and Fremantle. A rising journalist, the visitor has left us with a good account of the two ports and also of Perth and Guildford as he saw them in July 1865. This is held in Battye as a 12-page typescript, PR354, being an excerpt from the booklet he subsequently published, *The Voyage of the Forlorn Hope*.

Today many old families over in Virginia trace their ancestry back to the marriage in 1614 of the prominent colonist John Rolfe with the Princess Pocahontas, daughter of the leading Indian chieftain Powhatan. Such distinguished extraction is not overlooked here either. Thus, aided by an extra 'c' in the spelling, our Mick's sister Helen McArthur has long been endowed with the nickname Pocca!

Mick himself was also quite interested in his remoter forebears, and so it suited him well to spend the second half of his life ensconced in ancestral territory on England's lower east side. I had the pleasure of visiting him there three or four times.

Personally, most of all I have enjoyed every detail of Mick's evocation and treatment of local history and geography in *Midnite*, his children's classic of 1967, 'a nonsense novel' as he described it in an oral history interview in 1974 (a transcript in Battye, OH2377/4).

But to do that subject justice would take me another whole column some time.

In the online catalogue of the State Library as a whole, there are now as many as 174 entries under the name Randolph Stow, so forming a

most commendable bibliography of many and varied works by and about him. A collection of his manuscripts and other personal papers is held in the National Library and will be further augmented soon. Mick was indeed an outstanding literary figure on the local, state and national scenes. His family and many of his friends were pleased to be able to attend a well presented Celebration and Memorial Service for him in the University of Western Australia's Winthrop Hall on 24th August.
